Collaboration among multiple authors, colleagues and other scholars is acceptable with the consent of and contribution from all co-authors.

An article should not exceed 7000 words; Times New Roman, Font Size 12; Spacing 1.5, both sides justification, 1 inch margin (on the left and right sides).

Paper Structure

- Title of the paper.
- Abstract of 250-400 words.
- Keywords below the abstract; in alphabetical order and separated by commas.
- Introduction: background and purpose of the paper.
- Body: Clearly discuss the major message of your paper with clear line of thought, justification, problem statement and methodology (the approach you used to collect data for your paper); discussion and presentation of your findings, recommendations, and conclusion.
- Clarity and Consistency: Please check your manuscript for headings and subheadings; clarity of expression, repetition, grammar, spelling, punctuation, and consistency of references to minimize editorial changes.
- · References (Mandatory).
- Appendices (Optional).
